# **USD 429 Return-to-School Plan**



### Guidelines for USD 429 Troy Schools



USD 429, in shared communication with the Kansas State Department of Education, various school districts throughout the state, and the guidance available to us, has developed a plan to support school buildings and the community for reopening schools. USD 429's Return-to-School Plan provides a tiered approach with clear, actionable steps that are advisable before students and employees Return-to-School buildings. More specific details related to individual classrooms and buildings will be published closer to the start date of August 27th. The USD 429 Quick Start Guide should be referred to. This plan will be applicable throughout the 2020-2021 school year with changes and modifications when necessary.

This approach is built upon guidance and recommendations and is aligned to the reopening guidelines that have been provided by our state and federal leaders; and it is designed to prioritize the health and safety of students and staff as we open school buildings and deliver instruction for the 2020-2021 school year.

USD 429's Return-to-School Plan focuses heavily on the health and physical requirements necessary for reopening school buildings. USD 429 will continue to provide support to school buildings on navigating the academic, social, and emotional effects of the COVID-19 pandemic on students and employees.

USD 429's Return-to-School Plan provides the expectations and best practices to ensure a safe and successful 2020-2021 school year. USD 429 school buildings are expected to follow these expectations. Individual school buildings will have the flexibility to meet their individual needs and be responsive to their stakeholders with approval of the USD 429 Administration.

# Face Coverings



Face coverings differ based on the level of community spread and can be found throughout this document. Information will be provided to staff, students, and families on proper use, removal, and washing of cloth face coverings. # Hand Sanitizer



Hand sanitizers should contain at least 60% alcohol and only used with staff and older children who can safely use hand sanitizer. Hand soap should be used for younger children.

#### Low No Spread/Traditional Model

Students will attend in-person classes with health and safety guidelines in place to minimize the transmission of COVID 19 virus. The administration will determine the preventative practices and additional proactive processes/protocols that will be put in place based on KSDE guidance documents.

We recognize that a student may be an on-site student; however, he or she may need to be gone for a short or long-term period (2-14 days) due to sickness and/or quarantine. Please note the following regarding these absences:

- The student absence will be counted as an excused absence as long as the necessary documentation (doctor's note) is provided to the school.
- Most of the class

assignments/materials/lectures/instructional videos will be accessible through Seesaw (K-3), Google Classroom (4-12). In order for the student to maintain learning throughout this period, assigned work during the absence should be completed at home in a timely manner to the greatest extent possible.

● These students may have the opportunity to join the on-site classroom through Zoom or another tool to engage in the lesson with their peers and their teacher at designated times during the school-day. Parents (or the student, depending on age) should inquire about this directly with the teacher(s).

#### Minimal/Moderate Spread

The administration will determine the more intensive mitigation strategies that will be put in place based on KSDE guidance documents and consultation with the Doniphan County Health Department. Targeted closures will be implemented with consultation from the Doniphan County Health Department and or state officials...

Restrictive Traditional Model or Hybrid Model

Hybrid Models should only be implemented if absolutely necessary and after factoring in additional logistical requirements/cost as well as childcare requirements placed on working families and additional burden on staff.

**Possible examples** of the Hybrid Model are: (see Supporting Teaching and Learning)

• Specific Group Learning: Some student populations, or small groups of students could remain for traditional instruction while other student populations receive instruction remotely.

(Please Note: No final decision has been made regarding the specific format of the Hybrid Model as that will be determined by various factors at the time if this becomes necessary.)

# Substantial Spread Mandated Remote Learning

When the entire school is mandated to offer instruction through Remote Learning for either short, long or extended terms, it will be different from the Continuous Learning Plan that took place in the spring of 2020. It will be more rigorous and structured. KSDE is requiring 6 hours of instruction per day per student.

 Students and staff will be expected to complete hours similar to a normal school day.

# Transporting Students

- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
  - o Parents should conduct a daily self
    evaluation prior to sending their children to
    school (See below for details.)
  - Providing hand sanitizer for students and bus drivers
  - Allowing bus drivers and students to wear face masks/coverings
  - Students should sit by their siblings on bus routes. All buses must have ASSIGNED seats
  - o Fill up from the back of the bus to front
  - o Limiting field trips (to areas of limited/low transmission)
  - o Inspecting buses prior to students returning and as part of a regular rotation
  - o Cleaning and disinfecting frequently-touched surfaces on the bus at least daily
  - Airing out buses when not in use
  - Buses will not arrive until 7:45 so students are able to go DIRECTLY to the designated areas or classrooms instead of loitering in supervised areas.

- Provide hand sanitizer for students and bus drivers
- Provide face masks for bus drivers; require students and staff to wear face masks/coverings
- Screen students and bus drivers for symptoms of illness and utilize spaced seating (to the extent practicable)
- Eliminate field trips
- Clean and disinfect frequently-touched surfaces on the bus at least daily
- Establish protocols for bus stops, loading/unloading students to minimize congregation of children from different households

What Bus Operations Need to Know

School buildings are closed; if allowed and small groups can meet, bussing students to facilities may be an option.

  - Establish a protocol for visitors: calling front office before entering, screening visitors, requesting use of face coverings/masks, etc.

- Post signage in classrooms, hallways, and entrances to communicate how to stop the spread. COVID-19 symptoms, preventative measures (including staying home when sick), good hygiene, and school/district specific protocols.
- Establish a protocol for students/staff who feel ill/experience symptoms when they come to school (see When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School)
- Mark spaced lines to enter the building and designate entrance and exit flow paths
- Screen students and staff (to the extent practicable):
  - o Take temperatures ideally before entering buildings
  - o Isolate and send home if internal temperature over 100.4°F (38°C)
  - Consider safety and privacy concerns (confidentiality should be maintained)
- Establish a protocol for visitors: calling front office before entering, screening visitors, requesting use of face

# **School buildings are closed**; only *essential staff* report in-person to carry out functions that are *absolutely necessary*.

- District/school leaders must remain vigilant and purposeful as they determine roles, responsibilities, and reporting requirements for staff, refraining from blanket reporting requirements
- District/school leaders should leverage virtual tools and platforms wherever possible to conduct essential business and keep in-person reporting to an absolute minimum during school closures

#### Visitors, Parents, & Guardians

- o All nonessential visitors, volunteers, and outside activities will be limited.
- o Lunch guests are not allowed.
- o Parents may no longer come into the building to pick up their child for an appointment. At TGS, once the parent is seen visually, an adult will release the student.
- Parents may no longer come in the building to drop off lunch, uniform, supplies etc.
   Parents will be buzzed in. Parents must drop the item off on the table located in the entry way or front step.
- Virtual options for parent meetings and conferences should occur whenever possible.
- o If parents want to meet with administration, counselors, and/or teachers, an appointment must be made. First preference, if possible, is to do the meetings via phone or video conference call.

#### Procedures for visitors if allowed in the buildings:

- o All adults/visitors are required to wear a
- o All visitors need to answer "no" to the following questions to be allowed in the building. These questions will be posted at the entrance. If a visitor answers yes to any one of them, he/she will not be allowed in the building:
- o Have you had any of the following symptoms in the last 14 days?
- o Fever greater than 100.4°
- o Cough
- o Difficulty breathing/shortness of breath

It is up to each individual to take the precautions necessary so we can continue to attend school in person and participate in activities. Please do the following each day:

Conduct a daily self evaluation prior to sending their children to school by answering these questions:

- Has your child had any of the following symptoms in the last 14 days?
- Fever greater than 100.4°
- Cough
- Difficulty breathing/shortness of breath
- New loss of taste/smell
- Headache
- Sore throat
- Fatigue
- Has your child visited any of the restricted travel advisory locations on the KDHE list within 14 days?
- Has your child had close contact with anyone in the past 14 days who has been diagnosed with Covid 19?

If any of these questions are answered yes, the student should not come to school. Contact the school nurse, your local physician, or Doniphan County Health Department if you deem necessary.

USD 429 Iso and Quar Guidance

- Students will be provided with two cloth masks. Parents are encouraged to provide masks for their children.
- A clean mask should be worn each day and follow dress code.
- Please discuss with your child your expectations for mask usage at the school.

#### **Water Bottles**

Students must bring a water bottle each day as all of the water fountains have been turned into refillable water stations. USD 429 will provide each child with one water bottle at the beginning of the year. Water bottles brought from home need to meet these requirements:

- Labeled with first and last name
- Clear
- No larger than 32 ounce
- Sealable lid

- Stagger the schedule for large group gatherings (i.e. recess and school meals)
- Identify and utilize large spaces (i.e. gymnasiums, auditoriums, outside spaces – as weather permits) for social distancing
- Follow Kansas High School Activities Association guidelines for sporting events and practices

# Supporting Teaching and Learning



- Implement standard operating procedures while taking preventative measures such as:
  - Providing hand sanitizer for students and staff
  - Conducting cleaning of classrooms and high-touch surfaces each day
  - Limiting physical interaction through partner or group work
  - Establish an academic baseline
- Administer formative assessments toward the start of the school year
  - Conduct meetings with teachers to identify where students are academically
- Discuss the shared experience:
  - Helping Children Cope with Changes
  - Talking to Children about COVID-19
  - Teaching Through a Pandemic
- Target interventions and supports:
  - Provide additional instructional supports to:
    - students at-risk of not graduating on time
    - students with disabilities (compensatory services)
    - students who struggled in the prior distance/remote-learning environment
    - other students identified as being behind academically by teachers and parents.
  - Identify essential concepts/skills grade levels and provide access to enrichment (fine arts, music, world language, CTE, dual enrollment, physical education/play, STEM/STEAM, etc.)

#### **Traditional Instructional Model**

- Schools can deliver traditional instruction under Minimal/Moderate Spread by implementing the recommendations outlined in this guidance.
- Use the master schedule to balance class numbers as much as possible – remove unused desks and furniture in classrooms; maximize social distancing (to the extent practicable)
- Limit physical interaction through partner or group work
- Establish distance between the teacher's desk/board and students' desks
- Identify and utilize large spaces (i.e. gymnasiums, auditoriums, outside spaces – as weather permits) for social distancing

#### Hybrid Instructional Models (only ideas)

- Hybrid models should only be implemented if absolutely necessary and after factoring in additional logistical requirements/costs as well as childcare requirements placed on working families and unnecessary burden on staff. Consider allowing special education students to continue in-person instruction as these students often rely on daily routines and social interactions to address their individual learning needs.
- A/B schedules
  - Alternating Days: Students divided into two groups based on last names (families will stay together). Groups would alternate face to face instruction and virtual instruction during the week. Group A would attend Monday & Tuesday and work virtually the remainder of the week. Group B would attend Thursday & Friday and work virtually the remainder of the week. Wednesday

- Implement a robust Distance Learning Plan
- Distribute printed instructional packets/ materials and district/school communications along with meals; designate and communicate collection/drop-off points



Groups would alternate face-to-face and virtual instruction during the week. One example: Group A would attend Monday and Tuesday and work virtually the remainder of the week. Group B would attend Thursday and Friday and work virtually the other days of the week. Wednesday would be a virtual day for most employees so buildings could be cleaned during the week between groups. Another example: Group A Students Monday/Wednesday and Group B Students - Tuesday/Thursday; Friday – distance learning for all students, professional learning for staff; using certification flexibility to relocate teachers as needed and allowable  • Alternating Weeks: Group A Students – Week 1 and Group B Students Week 2; using certification flexibility to relocate teachers as needed and allowable  • Alternating Weeks: Students divided into two groups based on last name (families will stay together). Groups would alternate face to face instruction and virtual instruction during the week. Group A would attend Monday & Tuesday and work virtually the remainder of the week. Group B would attend Thursday & Friday and work virtually the remainder of the week. ## 1 Vulnerable Populations

-- Elderly individuals and/or individuals with serious underlying health conditions, including high blood pressure, chronic lung disease, diabetes, obesity, asthma, and those whose immune system is compromised such as by chemotherapy for cancer and other conditions requiring such therapy.

- Identify local COVID-19 testing sites
- Provide hand sanitizer for students and staff
- Provide PPE to vulnerable students and staff as appropriate
- Allow vulnerable students and staff to wear PPE throughout the school day (to the extent practicable)
- Establish a process for regular check-ins with vulnerable students and staff
- o Allow an early transition for vulnerable students to go to classes
- Limit large group gatherings/Interactions for vulnerable students and staff



- Survey families with vulnerable children to gauge their intentions in returning to a traditional school setting while maintaining confidentiality consistent with the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other applicable federal and state privacy laws
- Provide Hybrid learning opportunities for vulnerable student populations in consultation with parents and public health officials
- Consult with KASB board attorneys and district human resources officials to offer special accommodations (such as an alternative teaching assignment) for personnel who are members of vulnerable populations
- Adhere to FERPA and HIPPA requirement
- Adhere to state and federal employment law and extended leave allowances
- Offer an Employee Assistance Program to all staff members

# When a Child, Staff Member, or Visitor Becomes Sick at School



- Work with school administrators, school nurses, and other healthcare providers to identify an isolation room or area to separate anyone who exhibits COVID-like symptoms.
- School nurses and other healthcare providers should use Standard and Transmission-Based Precautions when caring for sick people. See: What Healthcare Personnel Should Know About Caring for Patients with Confirmed or Possible COVID19 Infection
- Establish procedures for safely transporting anyone who is sick to their home or to a healthcare facility.
- Notify local health officials, staff, and families immediately of a
  possible case while maintaining confidentiality consistent with the
  Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) and other applicable federal
  and state privacy laws.
- Close off areas used by a sick person and do not use before cleaning and disinfection. Wait 24 hours before you clean and disinfect. If it is not possible to wait 24 hours, wait as long as possible. Ensure safe and correct application of disinfectants and keep disinfectant products away from children.
- Advise sick staff members and children not to return until they have met state DPH criteria to discontinue home isolation
- Inform those who have had close contact to a person diagnosed with COVID-19 to stay home and follow state DPH guidance if symptoms develop. If a person does not have symptoms, follow appropriate state DPH guidance for home guarantine.

In partnership with the Kansas Department of Education, Kansas Department of Health and Environment, and various other schools districts, USD 429 has created these expectations as a blueprint for a safe reopening that is realistic and practical in our PreK-12 setting and on our individual campuses.
